During this semester Ms. Jayne's Year 1 class (8.3) have been revising our understanding and knowledge of 2D shapes and then moving on to learning about 3D shapes. We used coloured matchsticks to create our shapes.


LIBRARY NEWS

Parent Information Sheet about Reading





Dear families.

John Hartley School has moved with new department recommendations about how identifying reading behaviours in students are assessed. Students will no longer access the 'PM Benchmark' assessment that gave them a reading level. Instead, teachers are learning how to administer and use a range of mini subtests that identify how to target more specific reading activities to improve student reading. The mini assessments are called DIBELs- DIBELs stands for *Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills*.

What skills are measured by DIBELs?

The critical skills necessary for students beginning reading that are measured by DIBELs include reading behaviours such as, phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension.

Which tests will be given to my child?

Each student will complete the tests depending on their year level and the time of year.

How often are students assessed?

These mini reading assessments are given three times per year; in terms 1, 2 and 4. Staff may also assess students on the same test more regularly to check on progress to see if their reading behaviours are improving and how they can adapt their teaching to best support them. These regular checks are called progress monitoring.


How much time does it take?

Each of the DIBELS tests only take approximately one minute to complete. DIBELS tests are "indicators" of the student's reading ability and are not intended to be in-depth or comprehensive measures of reading.

How will the results be used?

A student's score within the DIBELs subtests give teachers information to see if a student is on track for year-level reading success. The tests identify students who do not meet the goals on each DIBELs subtest and how teachers can support their reading journey.

Teachers will look at the scores on DIBELs and other classroom assessments to make decisions about how to prepare their day-to-day reading lessons. We will also use the test scores across classrooms and year levels to make decisions on how to best use resources in intervention to make sure that every child in our school, including your child, is on track to become an accurate and fluent reader.


