
Dear families,

Governing Council

We are seeking a minimum of five parent reps to join Governing Council.

What does the Governing Council do?

What will my responsibilities if I joined as a voting member of the Governing Council?



Governing councils are bodies that govern a school or preschool.

Governing councils work with the site leader (principal or director) to help set and monitor the direction of a site.

A governing council meets regularly to talk about the direction for the site. The timing of meetings can be different for each site, but it's no less than twice a term.

Meetings are a big part of being on a governing council, but it's not only that. In your role on the council, you might:

- be on an interview panel to select the site's principal or director
- need to deal with media in response to an event or a good news story
- be an employing authority of out of school hours care (OSHC) or canteen staff.

You do not work alone when you are on a governing council. You and the site leader have shared responsibilities, but your day-to-day involvement is different.

Some differences between governance and day-to-day management

In your role on a governing council, you work with the site leader to:

- involve the local community
- develop and approve local policies
- set the broad direction and vision of the site
- monitor and review the site improvement plan
- be the employing authority of some services, including OSHC and canteen.

Site leaders work with governing councils to:

- give educational leadership
- carry out the site's policies
- carry out the site improvement plan.

Pre-School to School transition

In term 3 this year, we will welcome our first cohort of mid-year receptions. The school and pre-school staff have been working closely to ensure the transition experience is a positive and successful one.

The children have already begun transitioning, visiting the reception classes since week 2.

Beginning the process early, supports the transitioning children to start building positive connections with the students and staff in the classes they will be moving into.

The collaboration between the pre-school staff and school staff has also ensured that the school staff have an in depth knowledge of the needs (academic, social and emotional) of children who will be joining their classes.

The transitions will continue throughout the term.

High School transition

Families who have students transitioning to high school in 2025, should have received an email and filled in the information required to ensure their child is allocated a local high school.

If you haven't received an email or you would like support with completing the information, please contact the school and make a time to meet with either your child's teacher or a member of the admin team.

Pupil Free Day

On Tuesday 11 June, we have our second pupil free day for the year. The staff will spend the day, working through the National Consistent Collection of Data checklist.

The information/data provided by the school ensures we receive the resourcing necessary to best support students living with a disability.

School dress code

As we enter the colder and wetter months, can I remind everyone that students are expected to follow the school dress code. It is important that our students are wearing our school uniform for a number of reasons including safety, particularly when they are on the oval. We need to be able identify our students wherever they are in the school. The uniform also creates a sense of belonging, which we know the positive impact a sense of belonging has on our wellbeing.

If you are in a situation where your child/ren's school jumpers are in the wash or lost, we do have a number of second hand jumpers that people have donated in the office, or they can wear a school colour jumper (green or black) – no hoodies, underneath their school top.

It is our collective responsibility to support our whole school agreements and policies.







Week 4 focus: We are Kind

- Students will develop the understanding that being kind means treating others with care, showing empathy, and being helpful.
- Have a chat to your child/ren about different ways your family shows kindness towards each other. How do they feel when people show kindness towards them? Alternatively, how do they feel when someone is unkind toward them. Set a goal to use a certain amount of kind statements towards each other over the day/week.
- Share our school message: When we are kind to others and ourselves our school/home is a wonderful place to be.



Week 5 focus: We work as a team



- Students will develop an understanding that working as a team means cooperating and collaborating with others to achieve a shared objective.
 It involves everyone contributing, communicating, and supporting each other.
- Have a chat with your child/ren about times they might have to work as a team at school eg. Shared project, sport. What about at home? When does your family work as a team to accomplish something? Why do we do this? Set a task to do something as a family- this could be something like re-organising the garage. How did you feel when you helped each other and supported each other?
- Share our school message: When we work as a team everyone has a chance to contribute and feel valued.

Students have been practising using rulers to measure objects in the classroom.












PATTERNS



Health and PE - Term 2

'The Hartley Soccer Cup' - A successful start to Term 2 with 'The Hartley Soccer Cup' in full swing continuing during break times. Years 4-6 have strategised in their teams and resumed their battle for a spot in the finals. Group A and Group B, both endeavour to add points to their winning tally in hopes of finishing in the top 4. Finals to play on completion of the second round will result in two overall winners – one in Group A and one in Group B.

Winter Carnival (Friday 31st May, Week 5) - This will see 120+ year 4-6 students attend a multitude of events – Netball, Volleyball, Football, Soccer – in both boys, girls and mixed competitions within a 'Come and Try' event against all other schools in the district. Students are learning the skills and strategies for each sport through HPE lessons and are training with their appointed coach to develop their sportsmanship and teamwork while strengthening the school values of "*Respect, Responsibility and Resilience*".

Basketball Carnival (Tuesday 2nd July, Week 10) - A competitive event that will occur at the end of Term 2. Try outs will occur to select the top 7 year 5/6 students for both a boys and girls team. The teams will compete against the district school's best basketball students in an event to be held at StarPlex. HPE lessons and extra trainings will support the students preparation for this event.

The HPE program offers multiple opportunities for students to 'come and try' as well as 'try out' at a competitive level for all of its students. Our purpose is to support the student's growth in wellbeing, health and qualities that underpin the John Hartley School values: 'Respect, Responsibility and Resilience'
